

2. List of Courses Open to NUPACE Students

Provided that they have the requisite academic background, NUPACE students can opt to register for, 1) the English-taught courses in the student's major listed on pp. 1-6, 2) Japanese language programmes, listed on p. 7 and, if they possess JLPT N1, 3) Japanese-taught regular courses. NUPACE students are not restricted to the curriculum taught at their school of affiliation but, when selecting courses, should

bear in mind that many courses have prerequisites. Graduate courses may be open to undergraduate students; however, please note that the level of difficulty of these courses will be higher, and the grading criteria may be more demanding. Graduate students may register for undergraduate courses, but should note that credit transfer falls under the jurisdiction of their home institutions.

Prior to registration, however, they are requested to consult their academic advisors (pp. 26-28 and comply with the following procedures.

- 1. Consult with your academic advisor to obtain advice on potential courses to enrol in.
- 2. Inform a NUPACE faculty member of the details of the course you wish to enroll in and the reasons for this.
- 3. The Student Exchange Division will contact you regarding the possibility of enrolment.

2. Guided Independent Study:

In their second semester of study, NUPACE undergraduate and graduate students can opt to take advantage of the 'Guided Independent Study (GIS)' system. After obtaining permission from their academic advisors, students may, with the co-operation of their academic supervisor/research supervisor, pursue independent research in their major field of study. This research work will be evaluated and credits awarded accordingly. The maximum number of credits awarded for GIS is set at eight, and a guide to the expected length of GIS reports and corresponding credits is as follows:

10 pages \rightarrow 2 credits 20 pages \rightarrow 4 credits 30 pages \rightarrow 6 credits 40 pages \rightarrow 8 credits

5. Grading System, Transcripts, and Certificates/成績評価、成績表と修了証明書について

Credit-seeking Students:

With the exception of 'Special Research Students' and 'Short-term Training Students (Clinical Clerkship)', all NUPACE students are required to register for a minimum of 15 credits per semester, or a total of 30 credits per academic year. Those students who fail to obtain the required number of credits shall not be presented with a 'Certificate of Completion' upon completion of their exchange. However, in unforeseen circumstances, and where sufficient academic progress is seen to be made, 14 credits per semester, or a total of 28 credits per academic year may be deemed as meeting the requirements of 'Completion'.

NUPACE students who have earned credits will receive two electronic copies of their academic transcripts, one of which will be sent directly to their home institutions. The transcripts will contain the names of courses studied, number of credits awarded, and letter grades.

NUPACE Japanese NJ1, NJ2, NJ3, UJ5, UJ6, UJ7

NJ1 (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have very little or no knowledge of Japanese. Enables students to talk and write about themselves, their surroundings, and daily life. Equivalent of N5 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: TOBIRA 1: Beginning Japanese

NJ2 (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ1, or the equivalent. Builds on students' knowledge of basic Japanese grammar and fosters the ability to talk and write about their daily life, future, as well as facts and opinions about their surroundings. Equivalent of N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: NEJ: A New Approach to Elementary Japanese [vol.2]

NJ3 (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ2, or the equivalent. The purpose of this class is to further build upon students' knowledge of Japanese grammar and to foster the ability to understand, talk and write about familiar life situations, such as university life, part-time jobs, Japanese customs, travel, news, and events. Equivalent of N4~N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT). Textbook: *Dekiru Nihongo Beginner 2*

UJ501G Grammar (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ3, or the equivalent. This class organises and develops grammatical knowledge acquired at the elementary level, and enables students to use appropriate expressions depending on the situation and the persons involved. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ502W Writing (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ3, or the equivalent. This class enables students to briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions, plans and actions. It also enables students to write very brief reports which pass on routine factual information and state reasons for actions. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ503S Speaking (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ3, or the equivalent. This class enables students to enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g., family, hobbies, work, travel, and current events). Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ504R Reading (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ3, or the equivalent. This class enables students to read straightforward factual texts on subjects related to their fields and interests with a satisfactory level of comprehension. It also enables students to recognise significant points in straightforward newspaper articles on familiar subjects. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ505L Listening (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NJ3, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in university, leisure activities, etc., including short narratives. It also enables students to understand the main points of news bulletins about familiar subjects delivered relatively slowly and clearly. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ601G Grammar (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ5 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to learn more about the characteristics of how to use the grammar items learned at the elementary level while reviewing them. It also enables students to improve the ability to use grammar items related to particles, formal nouns, complex sentences, tenses, etc. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ602W Writing (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ5 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to summarise, report and give their opinions about accumulated factual information on familiar routine and non-routine matters within their fields with some confidence. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ603S Speaking (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ5 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to communicate with some confidence on familiar routine and non-routine matters related to their interests and professional fields. It also enables students to exchange, check and confirm information, deal with less routine situations and explain why something is a problem. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ604R Reading (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ5 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to scan longer texts in order to locate desired information, and gather information from different parts of a text, or from different texts in order to fulfil a specific task. It also enables students to identify the main conclusions in clearly signalled argumentative texts. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ605L Listening (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ5 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand a large part of topics of personal interest when the delivery is relatively slow and clear. It also enables students to follow lectures or talk within their own fields, provided the subject matter is familiar and the presentation straightforward and clearly structured. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ701G Grammar (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ6 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the subtle differences in the nuances of grammatical items that are difficult to use even at the advanced level, and to develop the ability to use them appropriately. Equivalent of N2~N1

of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ702W Writing (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ6 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to write clear, detailed descriptions of real or imaginary events and experiences, marking the relationship between ideas in clear connected text. It also enables students to write essays or reports which develop arguments systematically with appropriate highlighting of significant points and relevant supporting detail. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ703S Speaking (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ6 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to use the language fluently, accurately, and effectively in a wide range of general, academic, vocational or leisure topics, marking clearly the relationships between ideas. It also enables students to present and respond to complex lines of argument convincingly. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ704R Reading (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ6 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to obtain information, ideas, and opinions from somewhat abstract current and quasi-academic topics. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

UJ705L Listening (autumn & spring; 2 credits; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed UJ6 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand Japanese, on both familiar and unfamiliar topics normally encountered in personal, social, academic, or vocational life. It also enables students to identify speaker viewpoints and attitudes, as well as the information content. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

2. 漢字/Kanji

(Autumn & spring; 2 credits each; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

Kanji I

For learners who have very little or no knowledge of *kanji*. Introduces the 150 *kanji* covered at level N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Kanji II

This class introduces 300 kanji covered at level N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

3. 就職日本語 (Japanese for Job Hunting)

NB. The following course is taught in Japanese and requires at least level N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT), a UJ6 placement test result, or the equivalent.

Class: Fridays, 14:45-16:15

Credits: 2

Place: International Centre, Room 210 (face-to-face)

この授業の最大の目的は、ビジネスの現場で「いい人間関係を築くための日本語」を習得することである。積極的に外国人を採用する日本企業が増えており、就職活動では面接官といい人間関係が作れるか、就職した会社で上司や同僚と円滑なコミュニケーションが取れているかーこれらが日本で快適に働くためのカギとなる。

授業では、就職活動やインターンシップ、ビジネスメールに関する基礎知識を学んだのち、ビジネス日本語会話の流れと日本の企業文化の理解に焦点を当て、社内会議でのプレゼンテーションなど、ビジネスシーンで役立つさまざまなコミュニケーションスキルを高める。ビジネスの現場を想定したロールプレイやプレゼンテーションの練習も行い、ビジネス日本語の運用能力を高めると同時に異文化理解能力の養成を目指す。

The main purpose of this class is to learn Japanese language in order to build healthy relationships in the business world. More and more Japanese companies are actively hiring foreigners. Building good relationships with interviewers when job hunting and communicating correctly with superiors and coworkers at the company are the keys to working comfortably in Japan.

After learning basic knowledge of job hunting, internship and writing business emails, this class will focus on the natural flow of business Japanese conversation, understanding Japanese corporate culture, and will enhance various communication skills useful in business situations, such as presentations at company meetings. Students will also practice role-plays and presentations, aiming to improve their ability to use business Japanese and to cultivate cross-cultural understanding at the same time.

4.入門講義 <J> (Introductory Courses Taught in Japanese)

1. 日本古典 II (Japanese Classic Literature II)

Co-ordinator: MOMOSE Minori (momose.minori.t2@f.mail.nagoya-u.ac.jp)

Class: Tuesdays, 14:45~16:15

Credits: 2

Place: International Centre, Rm 210, (face-to-face)

In this class, we will learn about *Ise Monogatari*, a classic Japanese literary work. In particular, students will learn about the structure and formation process of *Ise Monogatari*, as well as the terminology and rhetoric of Japanese *waka*. Each class requires discussion and report submission.

この授業では、日本古典文学作品である『伊勢物語』を学ぶ。『伊勢物語』は、「歌物語(うたものがたり)」と呼ばれるジャンルに属する文学である。「歌物語」とは、和歌(わか)と散文(さんぶん:普通の文)から成る文学をいう。これは、日本文学独自のスタイルである。

【授業の目的】

『伊勢物語』を題材として、古典日本文学の歌物語について学ぶ。特に、『伊勢物語』の構成、成立 過程、和歌の用語や修辞について学習する。受講修了時の目標としては、自分で『伊勢物語』中の和 歌と物語の解釈ができるようになることとする。

2. <u>日本文学 II (Japanese Literature II)</u>

Class: Wednesdays, 14:45~16:15

Credits: 2

Place: International Centre, Rm 210 (face-to-face))

現代日本文学史を概観した後、主に1980年代以降の日本文学の講読を通して、表現や作品の背景について学び、ジェンダーや異文化受容の視点からも日本文化を考える。授業はディスカッションを含む。

【授業目標】

- ① 日本文学の移り変わりを知り、現代の小説や短歌の表現や、作品の背景について考える。

3. 多文化共生論 II (Multiculturalism II)

Co-ordinator: WAKAMATSU Ryota (wakamatsu.ryota.g4@f.mail.nagoya-u.ac.jp)

Class: Mondays, 14:45-16:15

Credits: 2

Place: International Centre, Rm 210 (face-to-face)

The aim of this lecture is to understand the cultural and ethnic diversity of people living in Japan, and to deepen ideas on issues related to the development of a multicultural society. Through case studies from the Tokai region (Aichi, Gifu, Mie and Shizuoka prefectures) and other areas with a high concentration of foreign populations, as well as Hokkaido and Okinawa prefectures that have inherited indigenous cultures, students will understand the roles played by the national and local governments and NGOs, and will learn how to solve problems in their own ways. Students will also read the narratives (texts and video works) of young people with diverse cultural and ethnic backgrounds to gain a concrete understanding of issues related to government policies (immigration control, education system, labour policy, etc.), economic disparities and family structure, and engage in group discussions and presentations.

この講義では日本国内に住む人々の文化的・民族的な多様性を理解し、多文化共生社会の形成に関する課題について考えを深めることを目的とします。東海地方(愛知県・岐阜県・三重県・静岡県)など外国人住民の集住地域や、先住民の文化を受け継ぐ北海道・沖縄県などの事例を通じて、国、地方自治体や NGO の果たす役割を理解し、学生自身も課題解決の方法を自分なりに考えられるようになりましょう。多様な文化的・民族的背景を持つ若者のナラティブ(物語)を、文章や映像作品を通じて読み込んで、行政の政策(入国管理制度、教育制度、労働政策など)や経済格差、家族の在り方に関する課題を具体的に理解し、グループで討論したり発表したりする活動も行います。

Place: International Centre, Rm 207 (face-to-face)

This course designed to develop students' fundamental skills to read reports in specialized fields and academic articles as well as write reports or dissertations related to their own research focus. The course aims to help students acquire skill for writing a logical short essay of around 1,200 characters through trainings of reading academic articles and writing a good paragraph. This course is intended to develop and integrate students' abilities in listening and speaking at an advanced level in academic Japanese. The course aims to help students acquire skills for making effective presentations in specialized fields. At the end of the lecture, students should, 1) be able to give a presentation, expressing themselves and using a style appropriate to an academic setting, 2) be able to ask questions appropriately, and give definite answers.

3. Academic Japanese 5 (Reading and Writing - Kanji 2200)

Class: Mondays, 18:15~19:45

Credits: 2

Place: International Centre, Rm 207 face-to-face)

Prerequisite: Participants should already know approximately 600-800 kanji.

In this course, participants learn about 2200 *kanji* and *kanji* words, which are listed by frequency. Students are required to take a *kanji* test in every lesson (240-640 words with 80 kanji) in order to increase their *kanji* vocabulary. *Kanji* tests comprise both reading and writing tests, of which the reading test is mandatory. After each *kanji* test, various topics about *kanji* (rules of Japanese *kanji* pronunciation, *kanji* transitive/intransitive verbs, passive/causative forms, etc.) are lectured on.

4. Business Japanese 2

This course is intended to develop and integrate students' abilities of basic knowledge of Japanese and expressions such as honorific language considered essential knowledge for business people in Japan. This course aims to help students acquire the communication styles and expressions required

in Japanese business settings through role-play exercise based on various themes. This course also covers basic knowledge of job hunting in Japan. At the end of the lecture, students should, 1) understand Japanese business culture, 2) be able to use appropriate expressions which are employed for building better relationships in a work setting, 3) understand the system of honorific language and be able to use honorifics properly.

This course is intended to boost Japanese language capabilities, enhance understanding of Japanese business cultures, and help students learn how to act independently in Japanese companies and Japanese-affiliated communities overseas. Specifically, the course aims to help students develop the following abilities

- (1) Acquire business Japanese language skills that can be used in the workplace and smoothly carry out work duties.
- (2) Use the acquired knowledge appropriately not only in the workplace, but also in academic situations and daily life.
- (3) Collect and analyse information related to employment and accurately communicate one's abilities in Japanese.
- (4) Deal with problems arising from "cultural differences" from multiple perspectives through case studies.

1. Program title:

NU Education Internship Program

2. Purpose:

The purpose of this program is to offer students direct hands-on experience in teaching at a Japanese secondary school classroom, under one-on-one guidance from a full-time teacher. Through active and intensive engagement in teaching students, they will gain insight into the responsibilities and expectations of Japanese teachers. Students will also learn to appreciate cultural differences in teaching and classroom management, and have the unique opportunity to engage with Japanese high school students. Consequently, this teaching internship will train students to deal with cultural differences in learning and teaching styles, as well as to learn the role expectations and obligations of Japanese teachers. Participation in the program should also be an advantage in gaining positions for the *JET* program (Japan Exchange and Teaching).

3. Content:

NU Affiliated High School Placement:

Each intern will be assigned to a mentoring teacher at the Affiliated Secondary School of Nagoya University. The mentor will work closely, on a one-on-one basis with the intern, training her/him on classroom management, teaching methods, student engagement and care, as well as taking part in extracurricular duties.

· Sample schedule of English classes for first- or second-year high school students:

In principle, students will be assigned to three English classes in their first or second year of high school as a team with other international students. If a student is unable to teach three English classes, he/she will be responsible for at least two classes and will be responsible for planning and organizing extracurricular activities after school and during other times of the day.

5. Eligibility:

- 1) Students who have attended the internship orientation and registered for GIS
- 2) Students who can proactively communicate with teachers and students in English
- 3) Students who are interested in international exchange activities, including English conversation classes, introducing foreign culture...etc.
- 4) Students who are interested in learning about cultural differences in learning and teaching styles, as well as the role expectations and responsibilities of Japanese teachers

6. Number of interns:

- About three students who can participate in at least two of the three classes and work in the same group
- Interns will be selected based on their applications, considering their reasons for applying and the number of classes they can attend.

7. Guided Independent Study (GIS):

Interns must register for GIS during the NUPACE registration period. At the end of the semester, Prof. Taniguchi will evaluate their grades based on their reports and award them three credits.

8. Responsibilities:

- 1) Follow the instructions of the mentor teachers.
- 2) Arrive punctually to start, work and finish on the assigned days and times.
- 3) Dress in business casual attire and do not wear jeans, shorts, sandals, or other clothing that is too casual and inappropriate for working in an educational setting.
- 4) Report, contact and consult with mentor teachers if you have any problems.
- 5) Never disclose any information obtained during the placement.
- 6) Do not take photographs with students. If you do take photographs at events or for academic purposes, be sure to obtain the consent of the high school students in advance, as instructed by the mentor teachers.

- 7) Do not upload any information or photos obtained during the internship to your own SNS (Instagram, X, LINE, FACEBOOK, etc.) or share them with outside parties such as your family and friends.
- 8) Never exchange personal information (phone numbers, email addresses, SNS accounts, etc.) with high school students.
- 9) Never harass students physically or mentally. Other acts that violate the instructions of mentor teachers, physically and/or mentally harm high school students, or damage the reputation or credibility of Nagoya University are not permitted.

9. Registration and procedures

- 1) Fill in your personal information on the Google Form by Sunday, April 13.
- 2) The school visit is scheduled for the week of April 21 during lunch. Students will meet in front of the NUPACE office during their lunch break and then proceed to the NU-affiliated high school.
- 3) Register for GIS.
