2. List of Courses Open to NUPACE Students

Provided that they have the requisite academic and language background, NUPACE students can opt to register for courses from, 1) the NUPACE programme, 2) G30 International Programmes and, if they possess JLPT N1, 3) Japanese-taught regular courses. NUPACE students are not restricted to the curriculum taught at their school of affiliation but, when selecting courses, should use their common sense and bear in mind that many courses have prerequisites. In limited cases, graduate courses may be open to undergraduate students. However, please note that the level of difficulty of these courses will be higher, and the grading criteria may be stricter.

NB. As entry to Japan continues to be restricted, only courses that are offered online will be available to NUPACE students this semester. All the courses listed below are online courses.

3. Notes on Japanese-taught and Other Non-NUPACE/G30 Courses

Students participating in NUPACE may be eligible to register for other courses offered to degree-seeking students at Nagoya University. Prior to registration, however, they are requested to consult their academic advisors (p. 28) and confirm with the instructor(s) of the course(s) in question that they meet the academic and language requirements of the class.

Special Research Students are students enrolled in graduate degrees (master's/doctorate level) at their home institutions who, at Nagoya University, wish to engage primarily in supervised research. Research students may register for credits, but are exempt from the obligation to earn credits at Nagoya University. Instead, they are required to provide the NUPACE Office with the results of their research work at the end of each semester. When submitting completed reports to their research supervisors, students are requested to copy (CC:) the NUPACE Office on the relevant e-mail.

Approximate length of report: 30 pages per semester (18 pages if written in Japanese)
Report submission deadline for autumn 2021 semester: Friday, February 4, 2022

2. Guided Independent Study:

In their second semester of study at Nagoya University, NUPACE undergraduate and graduate students can opt to take advantage of the 'Guided Independent Study (GIS)' system. After consulting and obtaining permission from their academic advisors, students may, with the co-operation of their academic supervisor/a research supervisor, pursue independent research in their major field of study. This research work will be evaluated and credits awarded accordingly. The maximum number of credits awarded for GIS is set at eight, and a rough guide to the expected length of GIS reports and corresponding credits is as follows:

10 pages → 2 credits	20 pages → 4 credits
30 pages → 6 credits	40 pages → 8 credits

If written in Japanese, the approximate required length is as follows:

6 pages → 2 credits	12 pages → 4 credits
18 pages → 6 credits	24 pages → 8 credits

When discussing GIS with their academic advisor, students should ask him/her to refer to the following manual for more details: 『指導教員・しどうきょういん留学生担当者りゅうがくせいだんとうしやのための交換留学生受入れマニュアルこうかんりゅうがくせいうけいれまにゅある』.

Students who engage in 'Guided Independent Study (GIS)' are required to submit their report to their academic advisors at the end of the semester.

3. Students engaging in Clinical Practice (Medical Clerkships):

Students engaging in clinical practice (medical clerkship) at the School of Medicine may register for credits, but are exempt from the obligation to earn credits at Nagoya University; instead, they are required to provide the NUPACE Office with a log report at the end of the semester. The log report must have the stamp of the student's academic advisor on the title page.

5. Grading System, Transcripts, and Certificates/成績評価、成績表と修了

Credit-seeking Students:

With the exception of ‘Special Research Students’, NUPACE students are required to register for a minimum of 15 credit hours per semester, or a total of 30 credit hours per academic year. Those students who fail to obtain the required number of credits shall not be presented with a ‘Certificate of Completion’ once they have concluded their term of exchange.

NUPACE students who have earned credits will receive two electronic copies of their academic transcripts, one of which will be sent directly to their home institutions. The transcripts will contain the names of courses studied, class contact hours, number of credits awarded, and letter grades.

1. NUPACE Japanese NP1~NP7 (NP1100~NP4100)

NP1 <NP1100> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have very little or no knowledge of Japanese. Enables students to talk and write about themselves, their surroundings, and daily life. Equivalent of N5 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: *NEJ: A New Approach to Elementary Japanese [vol.1]*

NP2 <NP1200> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP1100, or the equivalent. Builds on students' knowledge of basic Japanese grammar and fosters the ability to talk and write about their daily life, future, as well as facts and opinions about their surroundings. Equivalent of N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: *NEJ: A New Approach to Elementary Japanese [vol.2]*

NP3 <NP2100> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

Not offered this semester.

NP4 Grammar <NP2200 Grammar> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class organises and develops grammatical knowledge acquired at the elementary level, and enables students to use appropriate expressions depending on the situation and the persons involved. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Speaking <NP2200 Speaking> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g., family, hobbies, work, travel and current events). Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Listening <NP2200 Listening> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in university, leisure activities, etc., including short narratives. It also enables students to understand the main points of news bulletins about familiar subjects delivered relatively slowly and clearly. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Reading <NP2200 Reading> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to read straightforward factual texts on subjects related to their fields and interests with a satisfactory level of comprehension. It also enables students to recognise significant points in straightforward newspaper articles on familiar subjects. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

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NP4 Writing <NP2200 Writing> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions, plans and actions. It also enables students to write very brief reports which pass on routine factual information and state reasons for actions. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Grammar <NP3100 Grammar> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2200 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to learn more about the characteristics of how to use the grammar items learned at the elementary level while reviewing them. It also enables students to improve the ability to use grammar items related to particles, formal nouns, complex sentences, tenses, etc. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Speaking <NP3100 Speaking> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2200 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to communicate with some confidence on familiar routine and non-routine matters related to their interests and professional fields. It also enables students to exchange, check and confirm information, deal with less routine situations and explain why something is a problem. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Listening <NP3100 Listening> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2200 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand a large part of topics of personal interest when the delivery is relatively slow and clear. It also enables students to follow lectures or talk within their own fields, provided the subject matter is familiar and the presentation straightforward and clearly structured. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Reading <NP3100 Reading> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2200 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to scan longer texts in order to locate desired information, and gather information from different parts of a text, or from different texts in order to fulfil a specific task. It also enables students to identify the main conclusions in clearly signalled argumentative texts. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Writing <NP3100 Writing> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2200 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to summarise, report and give their opinions about accumulated factual information on familiar routine and non-routine matters within their fields with some confidence. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Grammar <NP3200 Grammar> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3100 Grammar, or the equivalent. While reviewing grammar learned at the elementary level, students will learn the characteristics of usage in depth. This class focuses on Japanese grammar related to particles, formal nouns, compound sentences, tense, etc., with an emphasis on usage. It enables students to acquire a relatively high degree of grammatical control and refrain from making mistakes which lead to misunderstanding. Equivalent of N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Speaking <NP3200 Speaking> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3100 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to

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give clear, detailed descriptions and presentations on a wide range of subjects related to their fields of interest, expanding and supporting ideas with subsidiary points and relevant examples. Equivalent of N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Listening <NP3200 Listening> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3100 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to follow extended speech and complex lines of argument provided the topic is reasonably familiar, and the direction of the talk is sign-posted by explicit markers. It also enables students to understand the main ideas of propositionally and linguistically complex speech on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in their fields of specialisation. Equivalent of N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Reading <NP3200 Reading> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3100 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand articles and reports concerned with contemporary problems in which the writers adopt particular stances or viewpoints. Equivalent of N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Writing <NP3200 Writing> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3100 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to write clear, detailed descriptions on a variety of subjects related to their fields of interest. It also enables students to write essays or reports which develop an argument, giving reasons in support of or against a particular point of view, and explaining the advantages and disadvantages of various options. Equivalent of N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Grammar <NP4100 Grammar> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the subtle differences in the nuances of grammatical items that are difficult to use even at the advanced level, and to develop the ability to use them appropriately. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Speaking <NP4100 Speaking> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to use the language fluently, accurately and effectively in a wide range of general, academic, vocational or leisure topics, marking clearly the relationships between ideas. It also enables students to present and respond to complex lines of argument convincingly. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Listening <NP4100 Listening> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand Japanese, on both familiar and unfamiliar topics normally encountered in personal, social, academic or vocational life. It also enables students to identify speaker viewpoints and attitudes, as well as the information content. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Reading <NP4100 Reading> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to obtain information, ideas and opinions from somewhat abstract current and quasi-academic topics. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Writing <NP4100 Writing> (autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to write clear, detailed descriptions of real or imaginary events and experiences, marking the relationship

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between ideas in clear connected text. It also enables students to write essays or reports which develop arguments systematically with appropriate highlighting of significant points and relevant supporting detail. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

2. 学術日本語/Academic Japanese Writing

(Autumn and spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

This class enables students to write Japanese essays with a clear structure, and accurate grammar and expressions. The goal is to enable students to:

- 1) Write essays that express opinions on social issues.
- 2) Write essays that explain their academic specialisation in a logical manner in relation to previous research.

Students need to possess a Japanese language proficiency equivalent to N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) or higher.

3. 漢字/Kanji

(Autumn and spring; 1 credit each; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

Kanji I

For learners who have very little or no knowledge of *kanji*. Introduces the 150 *kanji* covered at level N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Kanji II

This class introduces 300 *kanji* covered at level N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Kanji III

This class introduces 500 *kanji* covered at level N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

G30 Japanese Language Programme

Place: Online (Interactive)

In this course, students will acquire the fundamental skills to read reports in specialised fields and academic articles as well as write reports or dissertations related to their own research focus. At the end of the course, students are required to write an essay of at around 1,000 characters. Class materials are designed for advanced students.

Prerequisite: Participants should already know approximately 600~800 *kanji*.

In this course, participants learn about 2200 *kanji* and *kanji* words which are listed by frequency. Students are required to take a *kanji* test in every lesson (240-640 words with 80 *kanji*) in order to increase their *kanji* vocabulary. *Kanji* tests comprise of both reading and writing tests, of which the reading test is obligatory. After the *kanji* test, various topics about *kanji* (rules of Japanese *kanji* pronunciation, *kanji* transitive/intransitive verbs, passive/causative forms, etc.) are lectured on.
