2. List of Courses Open to NUPACE Students

Provided that they have the requisite academic and language background, NUPACE students can opt to register for courses from, 1) the NUPACE programme, 2) G30 International Programmes and, if they possess JLPT N1, 3) Japanese-taught regular courses. NUPACE students are not restricted to the curriculum taught at their school of affiliation but, when selecting courses, should use their common sense and bear in mind that many courses have prerequisites.

In limited cases, graduate courses may be open to undergraduate students. However, please note that the level of difficulty of these courses will be higher, and the grading criteria may be stricter. By contrast, graduate students may freely register for undergraduate courses. However, the decision as to whether credits earned in these courses can actually be transferred lies with the student's home university.

NB. As the majority of NUPACE students will not be able to enter Japan prior to the commencement of the spring semester, <u>only courses that are offered online/in a hybrid form should be registered for</u>. All the courses listed below are taught in an online/hybrid format.

Students who are able to enter the country and complete quarantine by mid-April, may be able to participate in classroom taught classes.

Students participating in NUPACE are eligible to register for most Japanese-taught courses offered to degree-seeking students at Nagoya University, provided that they have a suitable academic background and possess level N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT). 3. Notes on Japanese-taught and other Non-NUPACE/G30 Courses

Students participating in NUPACE may be eligible to register for Japanese-taught and other courses offered to degree-seeking students at Nagoya University. Prior to registration, however, they are requested to consult their academic advisors (p. 29) and confirm with the instructor(s) of the course(s) in question that that they meet the academic and language requirements of the class.

2. Guided Independent Study:

In their <u>second semester</u> of study, NUPACE undergraduate and graduate students can opt to take advantage of the 'Guided Independent Study (GIS)' system. After obtaining permission from their academic advisors, students may, with the cooperation of their academic supervisor/ research supervisor, pursue independent research in their major field of study. This research work will be evaluated and credits awarded accordingly. The maximum number of credits awarded for GIS is set at eight, and a guide to the expected length of GIS reports and corresponding credits is as follows:

5. Grading System, Transcripts, and Certificates/成績評価、成績表と修了証 明書について

Credit-seeking Students:

With the exception of 'Special Research Students', NUPACE students are required to register for a minimum of <u>15 credit hours</u> per semester, or a total of <u>30 credit hours per academic year</u>. Those students who fail to obtain the required number of credits shall not be presented with a 'Certificate of Completion' once they have concluded their term of exchange.

NUPACE students who have earned credits will receive two electronic copies of their academic transcripts, one of which will be sent directly to their home institutions. The transcripts will contain the names of courses studied, class contact hours, number of credits awarded, and letter grades.

***W(Withdrawal)**: Students may withdraw from courses that they have registered for, and provided that the relevant procedures have been carried out, these courses shall be marked with a "W" on students' academic transcripts. Please note that the deadline for completing withdrawal procedures is <u>Friday, May 27, 2022</u>.

Students who drop out of classes they have registered for without completing withdrawal procedures shall earn an "F" for those courses.

- 3. In order to complete withdrawal procedures, submit the signed form to the SED Office at nupacedesk@adm.nagoya-u.ac.jp by the deadline stipulated above. If the course instructor has technical difficulties, please forward a copy of e-mail correspondence to the SED Office, verifying that the course instructor has approved of your course withdrawal.

When applying to withdraw from a course, students should ensure that they still have the minimum credit-load for the purpose of earning a "Certificate of Completion". Please note that courses can no longer be added after the course registration period.
- 3. Students responsible for paying tuition fees to Nagoya University should note that a tuition fee refund for courses withdrawn from cannot be made after payment to their Schools of affiliation. The deadline for the payment of tuition fees is Thursday, April 28, 2022.

1. NUPACE Japanese NP1~NP7 (NP1100~NP4100)

NP1 <NP1100> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have very little or no knowledge of Japanese. Enables students to talk and write about themselves, their surroundings, and daily life. Equivalent of N5 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: NEJ: A New Approach to Elementary Japanese [vol.1]

NP2 <NP1200> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP1100, or the equivalent. Builds on students' knowledge of basic Japanese grammar and fosters the ability to talk and write about their daily life, future, as well as facts and opinions about their surroundings. Equivalent of N4 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

Textbook: NEJ: A New Approach to Elementary Japanese [vol.2]

NP3 <NP2100> (autumn and spring; 5 credits; 7.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

Not offered this semester.

NP4 Grammar <NP2200 Grammar> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class organises and develops grammatical knowledge acquired at the elementary level, and enables students to use appropriate expressions depending on the situation and the persons involved. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Speaking <NP2200 Speaking> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g., family, hobbies, work, travel and current events). Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Listening <NP2200 Listening> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in university, leisure activities, etc., including short narratives. It also enables students to understand the main points of news bulletins about familiar subjects delivered relatively slowly and clearly. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Reading <NP2200 Reading> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to read straightforward factual texts on subjects related to their fields and interests with a satisfactory level of comprehension. It also enables students to recognise significant points in straightforward newspaper articles on familiar subjects. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP4 Writing <NP2200 Writing> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP2100, or the equivalent. This class enables students to briefly give

reasons and explanations for opinions, plans and actions. It also enables students to write very brief reports which pass on routine factual information and state reasons for actions. Equivalent of N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Grammar <NP3100 Grammar> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP2200 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to learn more about the characteristics of how to use the grammar items learned at the elementary level while reviewing them. It also enables students to improve the ability to use grammar items related to particles, formal nouns, complex sentences, tenses, etc. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Speaking <NP3100 Speaking> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP2200 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to communicate with some confidence on familiar routine and non-routine matters related to their interests and professional fields. It also enables students to exchange, check and confirm information, deal with less routine situations and explain why something is a problem. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Listening <NP3100 Listening> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP2200 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand a large part of topics of personal interest when the delivery is relatively slow and clear. It also enables students to follow lectures or talk within their own fields, provided the subject matter is familiar and the presentation straightforward and clearly structured. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Reading <NP3100 Reading> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP2200 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to scan longer texts in order to locate desired information, and gather information from different parts of a text, or from different texts in order to fulfil a specific task. It also enables students to identify the main conclusions in clearly signalled argumentative texts. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP5 Writing <NP3100 Writing> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP2200 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to summarise, report and give their opinions about accumulated factual information on familiar routine and non-routine matters within their fields with some confidence. Equivalent of N3~N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP6 Grammar <NP3200 Grammar> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) Not offered this semester.

NP6 Writing <NP3200 Writing> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) Not offered this semester.

NP7 Grammar <NP4100 Grammar> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks) For learners who have completed NP3200 Grammar, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand the subtle differences in the nuances of grammatical items that are difficult to use even at the advanced level, and to develop the ability to use them appropriately. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Speaking <NP4100 Speaking> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Speaking, or the equivalent. This class enables students to use the language fluently, accurately and effectively in a wide range of general, academic, vocational or leisure topics, marking clearly the relationships between ideas. It also enables students to present and respond to complex lines of argument convincingly. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Listening <NP4100 Listening> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Listening, or the equivalent. This class enables students to understand Japanese, on both familiar and unfamiliar topics normally encountered in personal, social, academic or vocational life. It also enables students to identify speaker viewpoints and attitudes, as well as the information content. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Reading <NP4100 Reading> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Reading, or the equivalent. This class enables students to obtain information, ideas and opinions from somewhat abstract current and quasi-academic topics. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

NP7 Writing <NP4100 Writing> (autumn & spring; 1 credit; 1.5 hours per week x 15 weeks)

For learners who have completed NP3200 Writing, or the equivalent. This class enables students to write clear, detailed descriptions of real or imaginary events and experiences, marking the relationship between ideas in clear connected text. It also enables students to write essays or reports which develop arguments systematically with appropriate highlighting of significant points and relevant supporting detail. Equivalent of N2~N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

This course aims to integrate knowledge and skills of social psychology as they apply to the field of intercultural communication. By introducing students to intercultural education and training, covering background theories, practical methods, ethics, and evaluation, the course will allow students to get hands on experience in heightening intercultural sensitivity of themselves and others through active group learning, and application of the theories they will learn. As part of human resources development (HRD), intercultural education and training equips personnel with cognitive, affective, and behavioral skills to deal with cross-cultural interaction. We will look at cross-cultural theories that identify difficulty in communication between cultures, and then discuss what content and method would be most effective in training people to deal with such difficulty.

Students will work in teams to design and apply their own training exercises on each other, and discuss how their methods were effective or not. They will gain first-hand experience at practicing intercultural training methods, including role plays, simulations, and group discussions, hence this course is practical in nature, and requires full participation. Finally, students will learn how to evaluate and analyze the effects of training program. The goal of the course is to have students personally experience intercultural training, and have them critically judge for themselves whether they are effective tools for HRD
